Future Marine Rescue Service Name survey

The Future Marine Rescue Name survey closed on 14 January 2022. There was an overwhelming response from volunteers from both Australian Volunteer Marine Rescue Queensland and Australian Volunteer Coast Guard Association.

Thank you to all volunteers who participated in the survey, more than 900 volunteers participated in the survey which opened on 17 November 2021.



Results are being collated and we look forward to updating you on the results in the near future.

This was the first step towards the new look for the future service and with the Marketing Communications Reference Group being established and will commence work on the branding which includes the logo for the new service.

The reference group includes volunteer representatives and volunteers will be involved in the consultation process for the future logo.

Direct Relief Grants and Service Agreements

Squadrons and Flotillas who applied for the Direct Relief Grants have been advised of the outcomes of their application.

All applications were reviewed and if approved will have received the first instalment of funds.

The Direct Relief Grants were announced by the Minster for Fire and Emergency Services in 2021 and we look forward to working with VMRAQ and AVCGA to deliver this benefit to volunteers and their communities.

QFES and the Australian Volunteer Coast Guard Association have also finalised the current financial year service agreement (2021/22), which was finalised on 20 January 2022. QFES welcomes finalising the agreement after extensive negotiations and continuing to support AVCGA and its volunteers in Queensland to deliver essential marine rescue services in their areas of coverage.

Expression of Interests

There was an overwhelming response to the Expression of Interests (EOI) with more than 75 applications received with a high calibre of candidature. Thank you again to all volunteers that expressed their interest.

The Training sub-working group and Marketing Communications reference group are in the early stages of being stood up.

Australia Day Honours 2022

The 2022 Australia Day Honours have named several strong sector contributors among 1,040 Australians recognised this year.

Emergency Services Medal recipient Keith Williams



Keith Williams is the State Manager of Volunteer Marine Rescue Association Queensland (VMRAQ) and is dedicated to delivering water safety education to VMR members and the Queensland community.

He has forged strong relationships with other organisations to deliver state training and assessments for recreational marine licensing. Through this, he successfully developed the Marine Safety Education and Recreational Marine Driver's Licensing training for the Moreton Island community. He continues to advocate for remote Indigenous communities by providing them with the tools to continue marine safety training and assessment at a local level.

He works tirelessly to maintain VMR fleets, training and attitudes of VMR members, and supported QFES during the Blue Water Review.

Keith is an active marine operative, skipper and on-call volunteer during search and rescue operations in southern Queensland. He has been responsible for the safe return of many mariners in distress.

As an outstanding, trusted leader with a wealth of marine knowledge, his contribution to VMR Queensland's operational response, training and delivery of water safety education to the community is admirable.

Australian Police Medal recipient Senior Sergeant Jim Whitehead



Senior Sergeant Jim Whitehead is familiar to many marine rescue volunteers in his role as the State Search and Rescue Coordinator and Training Officer at the Water Police Group in Brisbane.

Throughout his 39 years of service working in Search and Rescue (SAR) positions, he has personally coordinated or provided advice in more than 15,000 SAR incidents.

He developed the Queensland SAR System, created national training packages for SAR Diploma and Advanced Diploma courses and facilitated training for numerous SAR courses within Australia and Internationally.

He created the Australian Lost Person Behaviour Database (online) which provides better success rates for SAR incidents. His involvement in major SAR incidents include providing advice for the MH370 plane crash, the Daniel Morcombe search, and the 2010/11 Queensland flood events.

We would also like to acknowledge:

QFES South-Western Region Assistant Commissioner David Hermann was awarded the Australian AFSM for his exemplary leadership, operational excellence and contribution to operational capability and community resilience.

Rural Fire Service (RFS) volunteer William Brand was also awarded the AFSM for his sustained contribution to the Brooweena and surrounding communities as First Officer of the Brooweena District Rural Fire Brigade.

State Emergency Service (SES) Operational Capability Officer Jason Daniels was awarded the ESM for his distinguished service to the community during storms, flooding, bushfires and search and rescue operations since 1997.

Vale Doug Meng



Queensland Fire and Emergency Services and the Marine Rescue Implementation team express our condolences on the passing of Doug Meng on 21 December 2021.

Doug began his 38 years of service with Beenleigh Air Sea Rescue (*now Volunteer Marine Rescue Jacobs Well*) in 1979 where he was a Foundation Member and also served as Secretary and Southern Zone Coordinator, along with wife Josie who began her service also at Beenleigh Air Sea Rescue.

In 1991, Doug and his wife Josie moved to Agnes Water and joined Air Sea Rescue Round Hill (now *Volunteer Marine Rescue Round Hill*) devoting their time to the Squadron and the community, holding committee and executive roles.

Doug was active in his local community serving on the Local Ambulance Committee. He received the National Medal for his service in 2017 and received a 2011 Flood Citation medal for his work during the floods over the summer of 2010 and 2011.

He was awarded Life Membership at Volunteer Marine Rescue Jacobs Well and Volunteer Marine Rescue Round Hill.

During his time as a marine rescue volunteer Doug was involved in many incidents including many Search and Rescues.

We send our deepest sympathy to Josie and her family during this time.

QFES is encouraging all marine rescue volunteers to continue to follow health advice including getting first and second vaccine doses and boosters when eligible.

Out on the water continue to regularly assess the exposure risk, ensure you are wearing the correct Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) during self-activation and Search and Rescue activities.
